

History

- The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) works with partners in the government, private, and nonprofit sectors to develop, implement, and promote effective *early detection, prevention, and cancer control* practices, nationwide.
- Within the CDC is the National Comprehensive Cancer Control (CCC) Program.
- The CDC began implementing the CCC Program through state health departments in the mid 90's.
- This led to the Wyoming Comprehensive Cancer Control Consortium (WCCCC) (2004).
- The WCCCC designed the 2006-2010 Wyoming Cancer Control Plan.
- The Wyoming Cancer Control Plan is now being implemented at the community level in 5 regions.

Why is the Cancer Control Plan Important?

- Wyoming has high Incidence Rates!
- **Cancer is the 2nd leading cause of death in Wyoming!**
- **Wyoming's target population is growing & projected to continue growing!**

POPULATION

- Wyoming's target population is growing & projected to continue growing!
- By the year 2020 it is projected that Wyoming's population will increase by 36%
- The population of 65 and over will increase by 113%

COST

For the 2006 Fiscal Year

- 1,550 discharges with cancer as the primary diagnosis came to a total cost of **\$30,908,532**
- 3,281 discharges with cancer as the primary/secondary diagnosis came to a total cost of **\$57,906,502**

The National Institute of Health Estimated in 2008:

- 24% of Americans aged 18-64 had no health insurance
- 13% of children in the U.S. had no health insurance
- The overall annual cost of cancer was **\$228.1 BILLION**
